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NEXT SEMINAR.

After a short break last Autumn, the next Seminar has been organised for Friday the 5th February 2010 in the University Chaplaincy in Old Aberdeen. The talk will be given by Dr. Clare Downham who organised the successful " Cultural Icons of Medieval Scotland" and is entitled " 18th Century Perceptions of Vikings in the North East of Scotland." ARCHAEOLOGY

The charcoal from the little fire-pit in trench 3 has been dated as 4930-4710 BC -- which dates to the Mesolithic period, before the introduction of farming in Scotland! The fire-pit looked as if it had been used just a few times, so it may have related to the campsite of people who were fishing in the river or hunting beside its banks

Charcoal from the matrix of the disturbed wall in trench 7, outside the churchyard wall, has been dated as 50 BC - 140 AD, during the later Iron Age; and the date from this trench shows that there was some kind of structure or enclosure, perhaps related to settlement, several hundred years before the monastery was founded. It might have enclosed or demarcated a settlement on the hill occupied by the churchyard.

While neither result is what we hoped for, both are interesting in their own right.

CHRISTIAN HERITAGE OF NORTH EAST SCOTLAND.

The YMCA based at the Gilcomston Church in Aberdeen mounted a display on the 150th anniversary of 1858—1862 Revival in the Central Library. The main display had a piece on St. Columba, St. Drostan and the founding of the Monastery. Parallel to this, there was a running exposition of the Book of Deer folios and publicity material made available to those attending. There was an excellent uptake. The exhibition was seen by the P6 and P7 classes of all the Aberdeen Primary schools with only one exception.

There are plans to circulate the display in all the the City libraries and those throughout Aberdeenshire.
